

5. Alternative Credits:
Submit description of at least one course meeting A-G, Dual Enrollment, Articulation, etc.
6. Future Farmers of America Constitution and By-Laws:
Provide a copy of the current Chapter Constitution and Bylaws with the election of officers highlighted.
7. Future Farmers of America Meetings:
Use meeting manager in AET or provide minutes for a minimum of six chapter meetings.
8. Agriculture Advisory Committee:
Provide meeting minutes for two Agriculture Advisory Committee meetings.

Checking all the required criteria as being met qualifies the LEA for Part A funding. Verification of meeting each criterion must be provided to the Regional Supervisor.

PART B – Additional Funding

LEA's may qualify for additional funding based on their ability to meet specific classroom, leadership, and experiential learning (SAE) criteria. It is not necessary for a program to meet all criteria in each category to be eligible to receive additional funding. Verification of meeting criteria will be taken from entries in the AET. The AET report will be developed based on data as of June 30th. Funding in each section will be based on the number of points accumulated in that section. This report will be used to complete Part B and will be included as part of the application.

Based on the 2023-24 Agricultural Education Incentive Grant Report, and points accumulated, the LEA may qualify for base level funding through the classroom section, leadership section, and experiential learning (SAE) section.

An LEA shall qualify for Part B funding in each section if they meet the predetermined base level. Bonus funding is earned if a program exceeds the predetermined base level by twenty percent (20%). LEA's meeting the base level shall receive \$2,250 plus \$250 per qualified teacher. LEA's meeting the bonus level shall receive an additional \$2,250 plus an additional \$250 per qualified teacher.

Note: An LEA may qualify for Level A, Level B, or no funding in each section but shall not qualify for both funding levels in a section. Example: The LEA qualifies for Level A funding in the Classroom Section, Level B in the Leadership Section and no funding in the SAE section.

- Each teacher (50 percent of their teaching load in agriculture) must have an extended contract and/or a project supervision period. The project supervision period must be in addition to the provided prep period.

If a program has met the three required criteria, they are eligible for funding and must complete the following Sections.

Section A – Earn one point for each criterion met.

- Held an FFA Officer team retreat or other planning activity prior to the start of school and continued to hold meetings during the year to plan FFA activities.
- In addition to the Agricultural Education Advisory Committee, the program has an Agriculture Boosters Club and/or an FFA Alumni Chapter.
- Program hosted a Student Teacher.

Constitution and Revisions

Article 1 Name and purpose of the Organization

Section A. The name of this organization shall be the Perris Chapter Future Farmers Future Farmers of America. "Members are here after referred to as Future Farmers of America."

Section B. The Aim and Purpose

The primary aim of the Future Farmers of America is the development of Agricultural leadership cooperation, and citizenship, the specific purpose for which this organization was formed are as follows:

1. To develop competent and aggressive agriculture leadership.
2. To create and nurture a love of agricultural leadership.
3. To strengthen the confidence of students of vocational agriculture in themselves and their work.
4. To create more interest in the intelligent choice of agricultural occupations.
5. To encourage members in the development of individual occupational experience Program in agriculture and establishment in agricultural careers.
6. To encourage members to improve the home and its surroundings.
7. To participate worth undertaking for the improvement of the industry of Agriculture.
8. To develop character, train for useful citizenship, and foster patriotism.
9. To participate in cooperative effort.
10. To encourage and practice thrift.
11. To encourage improvement in scholarship.
12. To practice and encourage the development of organized recreational activities.

Article 2 Organization



Section A. The Perris Chapter of the Future Farmers of America is a chapter of the Riverside Section Association of the Future Farmers of America, which may be organized only in public schools qualifying for federal reimbursement under the Vocational Act of 1968 (Public Law 90-576)

Section B. The advisor of the chapter must be a qualified vocational agricultural teacher currently teaching reimbursable vocational agriculture at the school.

Article 3 Membership

Section A. Membership in this chapter organization shall be by active members.

Section B. Active members must be in good standing with its dues paid at the chapter level.

Section C. Honorary Membership: Supervisors, school superintendents, principals, members of the board of education, instructors, teachers of agriculture, businessmen, farmers and others who are helping to advance vocational agriculture and the FFA and who have rendered outstanding service to the chapter organization, may be elected to honorary membership by the chapter organization.

Article 4 Chapter Meetings

Section A. A quorum shall be 50% plus one of the total chapter members.

Section B. No chapter business shall be transacted without a Quorum. Each active member is entitled to his/her own vote at each chapter meeting.

Article 5 Officers

Section A. The officers of the Perris Chapter Association of the Future Farmers of America shall be President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter, Sentinel and Chapter Advisor. The officers and the advisor constitute the Chapter Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall have full authority and control of the organization subject only to such regulations and by-laws as may be adopted by the Perris Chapter Association Future Farmers of America. The elected officers of the Chapter Association shall be elected annually in the spring, by a majority vote at the Chapter Meeting.

Section B. All elective Chapter officers shall hold office for one year after elected or until their successors are elected and installed, unless removed from office for cause by the Executive Committee. All vacancies may be filled by the President until the next regular election.

Section C. The election of Chapter officers will be based on the top votes secured by the members. The candidates will be slated by the retiring executive committee and advisors. Candidates must submit an application and go through the screening and interviewing process. All campaign materials will be removed before the voting of the Chapter officers. All Chapter officers must be enrolled in high school the year they serve as Chapter officer.

Article 6 Dues

Section A. Annual membership dues in the Perris Chapter, shall be fixed by members present at a regular Chapter meeting.

Section B. A member is in good standing with the Perris Chapter. When dues including those of its constitutional officers have been submitted to the Chapter Treasurer.

Article 7 Uniform

Section A. The official uniform for the members of the Perris Chapter Future Farmers of America will be that of the State Organization. This will include both dress and show uniforms.

Article 8 Chapter Awards

Section A. Perris Chapter Awards shall be given to members winning or competing in chapter contest and activities. The awards shall be decided upon by the executive committee and/or advisor.

Article 9 Procedure

Section A. Parliamentary procedure in all meetings of this Chapter shall be in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order.

Article 10 Amendments

Section A. Amendments to the Chapter Constitution shall be submitted in writing at a regular meeting of the Perris Chapter Future Farmers of America. These amendments must first be submitted in writing to the Perris Chapter Executive Committee for consideration. They shall be prepared for voting with recommendations. Amendments to this constitution may be adopted by two thirds members present at a Chapter meeting.

Section B. This constitution may be adopted to fit the needs of the Chapter organization provided they are not in conflict with Sectional, Regional, State, or National Organization.

Advisory Committee Meeting – October 17, 2023

The meeting was called to order at 6:05 pm by Aaron Nering at the Perris High School agriculture department on October 17, 2023.

The members introduced themselves and conversed about their involvement in the community. Next the agriculture teachers discussed the purpose of the committee to bring attention to the program and garner support for the committee. The committee should be aware of how our program is supporting the needs of the kids.

Our program is a 4 year program, all of our classes meet A-G requirements. Our program will fulfill the needs of students who want to attend college. Students can also earn art credits with floral design. Our new program is Ag Mechanics and Ag Welding and Fabrication. Our capstone course is Ag Government & Economics. We also offer Ag Leadership and Horticulture, which is articulated with MSJC to receive graduation and college credits. We have one of the largest programs in the state of California.

Some of our successes of this year include one of our CDE teams won state and were able to compete at the national level. We had an amazing fair with a reserve champion pig, 1st place novice sheep showmanship. We have a lot of students who are looking to get involved in the SAE program this year. Our officer team participated in and placed 3rd in the Regional Opening/Closing contest. Jaylah Coulter won region prepared public speaking and advanced to state finals. Abigail Nering won 5th in the Job Interview contest and won the rotary public speaking contest. We had a national delegate, section officer, section officer candidate and a student selected in the nominating committee for state FFA officers.

Our facilities are nearly complete and will be done by the start of December this school year. Our architects went up north to some well known agricultural mechanics programs to get the most state of the art designs. We have been in our current classroom building for the past 5 years and have our second graduating class leaving this building.

We have \$1000, sponsored by Altman Nursery who is pursuing ag education or horticulture. They also donate plugs, give tours and they support us tremendously.

We thank the members of our advisory committee for participating in our public speaking events hosted at Perris High School. We are looking for other ways to get into the Perris community and making community connections. If there are any opportunities for us to serve the community, we ask that you keep us in mind as we continue to expand our community service efforts.

One of our largest challenges for our program is funding students to attend and participate in events. If you have any ideas about fundraising or sponsorship opportunities. Our major fundraiser currently is selling chocolates so we are always looking for ways to help our students earn money for these events.

We will be adding a donation link on the student store website and reaching out to more local businesses such as Chick-Fil-A. Mr. VanWinkle is coming up with Agriculture Mechanics and welding fundraiser ideas. He is looking to start up egg sales and mechanics related projects such as ingrain wood cutting boards.

Where should we take our program next? Kristi would love to see more connection to careers in ag and agriculture colleges. We currently have only one class articulated with a college. Ag education currently has a push for certifications. Mr. VanWinkle is certified to teach and certify students in OSHA 10 for introductory safety in the mechanics classes. The OSHA 10 credential doesn't expire so students can take that credential to any job they go to. Mr. VanWinkle is also looking to partner with industry connections to get students certified with AWS.
