9.2 District Update by the Superintendent

Superintendent Araux reported on the following:

- Superintendent Araux introduced Maribel Escobar, Director of Human Resources, to present the following RAVE Awards:
 - Ms. Escobar recognized Martha Rocha-Puente, ASB teacher at Perris Lake High School, for her dedication to fostering leadership among students. She invests time in building leadership skills, empowering students to express their creativity, and take ownership of their projects. Her commitment goes beyond her contracted hours, and she actively supports staff and collaborates with her leadership team. Mrs. Puente's kindness and positive demeanor create a welcoming environment at Perris Lake. We are deeply grateful for her contributions to our school and students.
 - Ms. Escobar recognized Mr. Robert Bryant, Think Together coordinator at Perris Lake High School, for his exceptional dedication and service. He goes beyond his official role, addressing students' needs in areas like career guidance and wellness interventions. Mr. Bryant designs personalized plans for student success, and his mentorship has profoundly impacted many former students. He amplifies student voices through board presentations, fostering an environment where they feel heard and valued. His commitment to empowering student leaders makes him an invaluable asset to our school district. Thank you, Mr. Bryant!
 - Ms. Escobar recognized Mr. Ivan Lumba, school counselor at Perris Lake High School, for his unwavering dedication to our community. He left a comprehensive high school to support our at-risk students, demonstrating his passionate commitment. Mr. Lumba significantly shapes our school culture, ensuring every student feels heard and valued while providing clear pathways to success. He approaches challenges creatively, establishing resources like media labs and organizing college celebrations that inspire students. Notably, he founded the Perris Equity Education Center, which offers academic assistance, wellness, and career guidance, becoming a vital resource for our students. Thank you, Mr. Lumba!
- Superintendent Araux emphasized key takeaways from attending the Equity Conference in Palm Springs. He learned that equity is about meeting students where they are, which requires understanding their starting point, and recognizing that equity is not just about actions but about who we are at our core. This concept was reinforced by an impactful presentation at the conference.
- Dr. Araux attended multiple events, including Student of the Month recognitions, a ribbon cutting at Perris Elementary School District, and an English Language Advisory Committee meeting.
- Superintendent Araux expressed pride in Dr. Tejeda's recognition as a potential National High School of the Year nominee and praised her leadership.
- Dr. Araux participated in the KOTC event at Perris Lake, where he spoke with students and met with Congressman Takano to discuss support for the expansion of CMI.

9.4 CSEA President Helen Stimach

CSEA President Helen Stimach shared the following statement.

"Good Evening, President Garcia, Members of the Board, Superintendent Dr. Araux, and Cabinet, Well it's only the middle of the month, I feel like I've worked an entire month already. Between meetings for CRC, negotiations, and the professional development days, I wonder how we all get the regular day-to-day operations done, but we do. That said, I need to give a huge shout-out to Candace for making probably the best professional development days ever. We are in the process of gathering data and feedback from all participants. Mostly, I've been hearing about what great sessions we had, the in-house trainers, other provider training, delicious food from various food truck vendors, and an amazing keynote from our new superintendent. Thanks to Amil, The Pro-ACT certification training was offered to over 200 of our para-educators. Professional Assault Crisis Training, also known as Pro-ACT, is student-centered that teaches skills, and provides our staff with the tools to engage with students in positive ways, creating a safer workspace for everyone. Our educators learned to choose the right safety, de-escalation, and non restraint culture techniques. Amil is already looking at alternative environments for this training as a gym is great for the hands-on portion of the training, but the bleachers are not very comfortable for long periods of time. We look forward to having our campus supervisors receive this valuable Pro-ACT training in the spring. With these professional development days in our rearview mirror now, we look forward to what is coming next for us. Candace has surely set the bar high, which is a testament to her dedication and service to all educators at PUHSD.

I'd also like to give a special thank you to Maribel for assuming the role of Interim Assistant Superintendent and keeping us on track and informed during this time of transition. She's been a great support to our classified educators while juggling two positions. Thank you, Maribel, for your dedication and service to us all.

We are still in re-openers for 2024-25 on Article 9, Hours and Overtime and Article 10, Pay and Allowances. We are excited for the Board to approve Article 11 on Health and Welfare changes tonight and, hopefully, tomorrow to make headway in negotiations on the other two articles. Our successor contract is right around the corner, so we need to work diligently and efficiently with the District to finalize the still-open articles.

We always like to lead with the good before having to discuss the harder issues. We still haven't had the opportunity to discuss the elimination of positions due to retirement or promotion. We had 19 classified educators retire this past June, and to date, I believe three positions have not been filled, nor have we had the chance to discuss the effects of losing those positions. As our district gets bigger and workloads continue to increase, we are discovering that, on many occasions, administrators help by filling in those voids. Although we may appreciate the help of admin, it doesn't negate that we are allowing administrators to do classified work while being paid at much higher salaries. Please help us by allowing us to do our jobs and fill positions that help and support everyone in our district.

Finally, we have been in discussions with the District to bring forth communication to our educators regarding morale. We look forward to this survey so that we can assess the data and make any necessary changes to uplift our educators and make them feel valued and affirmed. There's nothing like coming to work, giving 100%, and leaving each day looking forward to the next one. That is the PUHSD and the superintendent standard and the way we should all want to be. I'm hopeful with direction and guidance, we can attain these goals. Today, October 16th is Boss's day. We hope you enjoyed your day, and we truly appreciate your leadership. Educators change lives. Thank you."

9.5 PSEA President Jason Miller

PSEA President Jason Miller shared the following statement.

"PSEA has eased back into a process of collaboration with PUHSD, as Dr. Araux has taken up the immense job of becoming our new superintendent. We had our first PRC in over a year just this last month, with a renewed sense of working together. I can think of several problems that have already been solved that possibly could have led to grievances and unfair labor practices. We do not feel that there should be a rush to grievances or unfair labor practices. With the exception of what timelines allow for there was a lot of cleanup from last year that Dr. Araux had to engage in, but he fits the role quite well. I am particularly impressed that he has a vision and structure through his pillars and systems to hold up the District. We had district professional development this last week, and our members generally have positive reviews. But in the last several years, our members have really felt that the professional development was poorly planned and executed. And the term I heard quite a bit from years past is that they were not useful. I have not really heard that this year. This year was different. Joe Williams had told us some ideas for getting professional development back on track right before and when he became interim superintendent. These innovative ideas included bringing back different session options and choices for most certificated staff. Having teachers and employees run some of the professional development. having one day for all District PD and one day for site PD for site-specific needs, including ideas of doing PD well and not trying to emphasize PD with some overpriced celebrity consultant group or program. The 2024-25 PD emphasizes getting back to basics with quality over quantity rather than some cabinet members saying, oh, guess who we got to speak this year. I also want to give a shout-out to one of our own for professional development. Donna Good, a PSEA executive board member who serves as our director of ethnicity and LGBTQ, ran an amazing session on Al in the classroom. Some people even wanted to take it twice. Donna made a PowerPoint assessment, summary activity, and worksheet for an article in under

ten minutes. I know that I will personally be using this, and I am so glad the PD was the most useful one for our members since we have come back from the pandemic. Thank you for this time to speak."

Trustee Nelissen noted that the agenda was missing a bullet point for comments at the beginning, which was unusual, and suggested it be added for next month. He shared his experience attending the Paloma Valley Homecoming game, in which the team won. And, he enjoyed the whiteout theme and the excitement of students, especially with the use of powder for the first time. Trustee Nelissen also expressed interest in attending upcoming volleyball playoff games. He wished everyone a happy Halloween and looked forward to seeing everyone in November.

Trustee Vallejo expressed concern about a lack of transparency and fairness during the meeting. She pointed out that a request for clarity and questions (regarding item 14.6) was not addressed, leaving the community and staff without an explanation they deserved. Trustee Vallejo emphasized her frustration, stating that her concerns were ignored and criticized the Board for not recognizing the seriousness of the situation. She also mentioned feeling betrayed as a board member, particularly about the close relationship between a person involved and two other board members, which she felt appeared unethical. Trustee Vallejo demanded an explanation and wanted the community to receive one as well.

Trustee Stafford shared that he enjoyed attending Paloma Valley's homecoming football game with his oldest granddaughter, who was attending her first football game. He congratulated Heritage High School's FFA and

thanked Nutrition Services for providing food samples, noting that he had recently eaten at Heritage's cafeteria and was impressed by the food quality. He observed that students seemed to eat more than before, which he saw as a positive sign. Trustee Stafford also expressed appreciation for the District meeting federal nutrition standards. He wrapped up by mentioning that he hoped to attend more upcoming homecoming events the following week.

Trustee Campos expressed gratitude to Maribel Escobar for her contributions in filling gaps in the HR department over the past couple of months, acknowledging the staff's collective efforts. He also thanked Helen Stimach and Jason Miller for sharing information about Professional Development (PD) Day, emphasizing that the day was productive and helpful.

Trustee Campos then addressed a comment made by Trustee Vallejo, discussing his perspective on hiring both within and outside the education sector. He explained that he is open to hiring individuals from outside the public education field because they bring fresh, outside-the-box thinking, which can be valuable. He believes hiring people with diverse backgrounds can challenge conventional thinking and offer innovative approaches, particularly when it comes to leadership roles. Trustee Campos defended the hiring process for the position in question. He explained that a firm was hired to vet candidates, and the best candidate was chosen after a thorough selection process. He asserted that he does not feel guilty or believe the process lacked transparency, as the community's interests were fulfilled by selecting the right candidate. He concluded by expressing confidence in his decision and his commitment to his duties as a Trustee.

Trustee Garcia explained that board members cannot respond to community questions due to the Brown Act, which governs public meetings. He expressed frustration with ongoing political attacks against board members, especially from Trustee Vallejo who is running for City Council, and suggested that board meetings are not the appropriate setting for such criticism. Trustee Garcia also briefly touched on a question raised during a closed session, admitting that it wasn't a topic he had considered at the time, as the candidates for final approval were simply presented in the usual process.

Trustee Garcia recognized the Riverside County Sheriff's department for their hard work and bravery, offering his thanks for their service. He congratulated the RAVE award recipients, emphasizing the importance of recognizing everyone's contributions within the District. He also praised Dr. Araux for his engagement with students and highlights the significant progress on the CMI project, which he hopes will help bring more people and attention to the City of Perris and CMI.

Lastly, Trustee Garcia invited Mr. Belloso and Trustee Vallejo to engage in civil dialogue over shared concerns, offering to "break bread" and answer any questions they might have.
